



He may not have even been raised by his parents. [9,18] His son, Herman, said Martin did not have brothers or sisters; he may not even have been raised by his parents. [18]

He had no relatives - "Grandma found him hanging on a bush someplace." [18]

NOV 2005 - first found mention of a Schulz related -- from son Henry's baptism record. [CAS]

Nelson Schultz said his father, Herman, used to tell him that Grandpa Schultz was the manager of a brick making firm in Germany that was owned by the Bismarck of Germany. He would conduct tours of the firm with the Bismarck when he came to check on business. [15]

History of Reinfeld by Barnow [27]

Reinfeld was first mentioned in a letter written by the von Puttkamer family in 1527. The name Reinfeld was also mentioned as the land was being colonized. Around 1600 part of Reinfeld became a Freischulzenhof, a German culture and style village of primarily farming and related citizens. It was destroyed in the 30-year war of 1618-1648, and later was rebuilt.

At first, Reinfeld was connected with Barnow. Over time it became known as Reinfeld B, to indicate it was located by Barnow, to distinguish it from Reinfeld R (later known as Reinfeld - Hammer), located in southern Kreis Rummelsburg near the city of Rummelsburg. In 1685 Reinfeld had only 6 farmers. In 1719 there were 8 farmers, and that number remained through the 18th century.

In 1699, Henning Brand v Puttkamer of Barnow purchased Barnow and also a portion of Reinfeld B. His third son, Martin Anton, raised as a freeman, inherited the property in 1720. This Reinfeld B portion was inherited by his sister, who married Stephan Ludwig v Puttkamer.

She transferred this property to their youngest son Anton Ludwig in 1751, and in 1752 the latter also bought the rest of Reinfeld B that had belonged before to the Widow of Anton Christian v Massow, and which her two daughters, married to v Zastrow and v Coirep, inherited.

Here is how that evolved.

In 1749, the son of the first daughter, Ernst Christian v Zastrow, had exchanged their portion of Reinfeld B to Jacob Reinhold v Massow for a portion of Reinfeld R. In 1752, Anton Ludwig v Puttkamer bought this portion of Reinfeld B from Jacob Reinhold v Massow for 100 Reichsthalers. Anton now owned all of Reinfeld B. In 1757, it was sold to the Freischulzenhof for 270 Reichsthalers. In 1766, two desert farming areas, part of the Freischultzenhof, were transferred to the village of Poberow for compensation.

In 1798, Jacob Georg v Puttkamer bought all of Reinfeld B from the existing owner for 14,000 Reichsthalers. That was 52 times what the



Freischulzenhof had purchased it for in 1757. In 1819, Jacob left the estate to his oldest son, who was able to keep the property following major regulatory changes adopted on Oct 17, 1823. With these changes, guidelines were implemented on how villages were administered, and additional government support was made available. Provincial parliaments were established in Pommern, which were responsible for road construction, welfare systems for the poor, fire insurance, and other things. Reinfeld B was sold in 1839 to Luitgarde v Puttkamer geb v Glasenapp, mother of Johanna, who became the wife of Otto von Bismarck, the first Chancellor of Germany and, in 1871, the Fürst of Bismarck (Prince of Bismarck).

Following Luitgarde's death in 1863 in Reinfeld B, Johanna inherited it in 1866. On Oct 30, 1874, Fürst Herbert v Bismarck, the oldest son of Otto and Johanna, became the owner. On Jun 8, 1890 Herbert arranged to transfer it to his first son, yet to be born, Gottfried Graf v Bismarck, who was born in Berlin Mar 29, 1901. Gottfried was the Owner of Reinfeld B until 1945. He died in 1949.

Reinfeld B had 133 residents in 1812, 308 residents in 1871, and 330 residents in 1925. Today it has about 234 residents.

In Germany she had a very good friend in Mrs. Bismarck. Mrs. Bismarck often would visit Henrietta in her home. Henrietta's daughter, Emma, remembered that Mrs. Bismarck had a coachman who drove a handsome carriage drawn by white horses. She would arrive and depart this way. [3,10-13,15]

Carl Greiffendorf was a "coachman" for the von Puttkammer family. Carl Greiffendorf (born 1825), was the brother of Wilhelmine Greiffendorf Gast. It is not known if this is the coachman who drove Mrs. Bismarck to Henrietta's home though. [26]

She always had a large (2'x3') full body picture of the Bismarck hanging in their home until WWI when it was impounded by the government. It was a full length picture of him in color. [13]

Johanna von Puttkamer was born Reinfeld on 11 APR 1824. She married Bismarck on 28 JUN 1847 in Alt Kolziglow. Johanna died on 27 November 1894 in Varzin. [23]

She raised her granddaughter, Minnie Knuth. A daughter Minna Schultz [sic] is named in her probate - this must be Minnie Knuth. [3,9]

She had a birthday on New Year's Day and all her children who were able to come always came to help her celebrate. She would really have a houseful on that day. No one was especially invited, but everybody who was able to come would come so her little house almost burst at the seams at times. Gifts were always brought to her on her birthday. This is how she got so many of her pretty dishes, some of which Marty shared with Elsie. [3]

The 4th of July was another day every relative who was in town would come to the house to eat. Kids were going in and out of the house all day long. It took the whole next day to get the flies out of the house. [3]

Henrietta had a couple of bushel of amber canning jars that her daughter, Martha, later smashed and buried in her yard in Baroda. [8]

Henrietta took Minnie to raise when Pauline died in childbirth. Martha was ten years old and was jealous of Minnie. Many times Martha would blame things on Minnie and Henrietta would punish Minnie. [16]

Carl Knuth had his eye on Marty Schultz (later married Will Tietz) after his wife Pauline (Marty's sister) died. He wanted to marry Marty, but Henrietta really put her foot down and told him "NO" he had enough kids - to go marry someone his own age. Also Henrietta didn't approve of Marty marrying Will Tietz. She was very much against it because he was a heavy drinker and "boozer." She was very much against Marty marrying anyone and insisted she stay home with her and take care of her. (Note Henrietta's death date and Marty and Will's marriage date.) [4]

She only had one tooth when she was older. It was a wide tooth on the side between two stubs. [3]

All the children had blue eyes except Marty who had green eyes. [3]

Many German people stayed with Martin and Henrietta when first arriving in St. Joseph from Germany. The Schulz's lived very close to the train station in St. Joseph in a very small house. All of that area is now vacation/beach homes as it is right off the beach of Lake Michigan. The house is about a block and a half south of the railroad station just below the bluff and facing the bluff. [8]

Aged Woman Died This Afternoon [14]

Mrs. Henrietta Schultz, who has been gradually failing for the past eight months, died this afternoon at 1:30 at her home on Vine street, at the age of 75 years. Death was due to old age.

Mrs. Schultz came to this city 32 years ago from her native country, Germany, where she was born January 1, 1840.

There are surviving her three sons, Henry Schultz of Court street and August and Herman of Baroda, four daughters, Mrs. Huldah Tollas of this city, Mrs. Bertha Krause and Mrs. Peter [sic] Krause of Scottdale, and Miss Martha Schultz and a grand-daughter, Minnie Knuth, both of whom reside at the family home on Vine street. She also has a brother, Carl Loraff, residing in South Dakota.

Mrs. Schultz was a memer of St. Peter's Evangelical church.

Mrs. Schultz Buried This Afternoon [14]

Preceded by brief prayer services at the family residence on Vine street, the funeral of the late Mrs. Henrietta Schultz was held from St. Peter's Evangelical church at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

The Ladies' Aid society of which Mrs. Schultz was an active member, attended in a body and sang "The Rest of the Soul at Home," and a choir made up of Misses Tillie Schrage, Helen Buehler, Louise Fechner and Lydia Tollas, and Messrs. August Biastock, Ferdinand Streich, Arthur Haase, William Meschke and Edward Archut, sang "Longing For the Heavenly Home" and "At Home."

Messrs. Fred, Henry and Herman Kasischke, Charles Taubie and Fred and Albert Bartz acted as pallbearers. The burial took place in the city cemetery.

This Branch-One-B of the Krause name were from Viartlum, Zettin Parish, Kr. Rummelsburg which is 30-35 miles north and east of the Schlochau area where Branch-One-A Krause were located prior to coming to America in 1884. DNA testing has shown that these two branches descend from a common ancestor - but at least a couple of generations before Leopold and Christian.

An email received from Daniel Frederick Krause on 17 May 2005 stated the following for the time that Branch-One-B Krause had been in Kr. Rummelsburg:

"Inge Krause Douthitt had mentioned about 300 years that she knew of for sure. She said the farm/land had been in the family that long. I believe they were in the area much longer before becoming landowners, but have nothing to prove it yet. So probably 300 years is a better number for now One of my deceased relatives mentioned the 600 year figure, but when she died, her husband tossed all her genealogy records, pictures, history.. everything. He didn't see the value in keeping it, and we didn't get to him in time.

This is why I am trying to find land records, census, tax records, whatever from that area that would show land ownership or at least they were major farmers under whatever noble was in charge."

11S. Emilie\Amelia Louise Schwichtenberg

AMELIA (1841-1927)

Amelia, as known by her family, was the third known child of Johann and Wilhelmine Schwichtenberg, born in Pommern Germany, emigrating to the North Morristown, MN farming area with her husband, Hermann Dietrich Schulz, and family. Amelia was listed as Emilie on the BRAUNSCHWEIG ship list. Hermann and Amelia (Emilie) and their six children, Carl (17), Franz (16), Minna (11), Ludwig (6), Bertha (3), Pauline (11 months), arrived in Baltimore, MD on April 17, 1884 from Bremen, Germany aboard the Braunschweig Ship. Their names are spelled as listed above in the Germans to America Genealogy Books which contain all the ships and passengers of Germans emigrating to America. The Germans to America book notes their province of origin as Prussia; Prussia was united with Germany at that time. Benno Block, a genealogist living in Germany, sent Jane Teschke a note in 2008 that he found the birth record of Bertha, the daughter of Hermann & Emilie/Amelia (Schwichtenberg) Schulz, born in Wussowke, Kreis Rummelsburg, a very small farm settlement between Treblin and Treten. Hermann Schulz is listed as a Klein Pachter, meaning he rented a small farm.

They were concerned and prayed for the safety and health of all the family on the long trip over the ocean. They dreaded the thought of

being buried in the ocean if death should occur as noted by Lillian Glende Wildberg, their granddaughter. Amelia and family followed her brother, Frank and family, who emigrated to America in 1881 to also avoid the drafting of their sons in the Prussian Army. Amelia's brothers, Ferdinand and Albert Schwichtenberg, and families also emigrated to the North Morristown area together in 1886; and her sister, Julia Schwichtenberg Bittrich emigrated in 1892.

Hermann and Amelia Schulz homesteaded a farm in Shieldsville Township, three miles northwest of Trinity Lutheran Church, North Morristown, the area, where their sons, Carl and Frank, also farmed. Great-greatgranddaughter Linda Schultz Strub, also great-granddaughter of Carl and Auguste Schulz recorded information about life on the farm they homesteaded: "They settled in Rice County on a small acreage which they homesteaded (1884). It was said that gypsies became a constant problem because of their sudden appearances and of perhaps the rumors and rituals which circulated throughout the small farming community. As there was no apparent problem with over-population, the small farming communities managed annual contests and get-togethers where various talents and arts could be displayed and famous stories and or "whoppers" soon found their origins. Life in America seemed much like that in Pommern, Germany were Hermann and Amelia Schulz and family were considered peasants or field hands while in the employ of a wealthy farmer. Coming to America and to Rice County really wasn't a new experience but rather a great adventure and perhaps even a step forward in society."

Their marriage was blessed with seven children, with six children born in Pommern, Germany and the seventh child, Anna, born in Shieldsville Township:

There is little known information about Minna, Bertha, and Ludwig Schulz. Minna is reported to have married August Gleve, and we do know from a post card that her daughter, Alice, took the picture of Minna on the post card. We also have been given information by Susan Mecredy that her mother, Lillian Wildberg, remembers that Minna lived in St. Paul with her husband and family, one son and one daughter, where they operated a truck garden. Later on they moved to California. Bertha went to the Twin Cities area to be trained as a seamstress, but nothing further is known at this time. Ludwig is reported to have possibly died from diphtheria at a young age.

But Hermann and Amelia's youngest children, Pauline and Anna, married brothers, Carl and Paul Glende, Sr., sons of August and Elbertina Seils Glende who emigrated from Gr.(oss) Krien (Grossegreen), Kreis Stolp, Pommern Germany, which was 24 km from Stolp, Pommern. According to Helmut Kunefke, a current German Genealogist who has researched Kreis Stolp and Kreis Rummelsburg, there were many Schulz and Schwichtenberg names in that area. Today this area is northern Poland. In Minnesota the Schulz family homesteaded a farm three miles northwest of Trinity Lutheran Church, North Morristown, and the Glende family chose a site two miles west of the Schulz homestead.

Memories of the household included their father, Hermann, giving the farm animals special food treats for Christmas, a custom he practiced. Their Christian home celebrated God's presence each morning with devotions before breakfast. The Greatest Treasure, God's Word, was not lost in their household.

Hermann died at age 76 in 1912 from stomach cancer, and Amelia died at age 85 in 1927, with interment at Concordia Cemetery, North Morristown, MN.

August and his brothers, Herman and Henry, had a merry go round and would move it to St. Joseph for the 4th of July. At one they set up their merry go round and did a thriving business with it on a vacant lot where the Vincent Hotel was in Benton Harbor. At another time they operated it from decoration day through labor day on the lot where the St. Joseph post office stands. A lot of evangelists, singers, and other shows were also scheduled there. While at the St. Joseph site they were molested a great deal by drunks and rowdies. On one occasion, a Fourth of July morning, when the morning boat from Chicago docked at 5 o'clock, two or

three drunk men came up to where their merry go round stood and concluded it would be fun to run the thing themselves. So they fired up the steam boiler used to generate power to run the outfit then started to take the canvas off the apparatus. There they were confronted by August and his brother who slept in the tent to guard their property. The men were driven off in a fight that ensued. They would book the merry go round a week or so in Stevensville, Baroda, Bridgman, or Berrien Springs. [1,5-7,12]

About 1906 a new stone road (later Highway 31) was being built along the Niles road. August worked on this road with his brother-in-law, Herman Krause. He also worked on many other roads. [1-2]

He divorced his first wife because she tried to poison him several times. [1]

August liked the women. He convorted with the wife of one of his workers on the farm. Once he went to his brother Henry's with that woman sitting side of him in the buggy and his first wife in the back seat. Henry, Emma, and others were so disgusted, but Martha always sided with August. So Martha and Henry's wife, Edith, didn't get along either. [5] He dated his second wife before he married his first wife. The Tollas' thought his first wife was jealous of a tenant's wife and that's why she poisoned him. The daughters were in on it, too. She put poison in drinking water the girls carried out to him in the strawberry field. The doctor worked all night with him and told him to leave or she'd do it again. Aunt Martha Tietz took him in and nursed him back to health. He divorced his first wife. Later he remarried the first Pauline he dated. She was a widow. They were very happy. [11]

His daughter Emma said August kept meeting the hired man's wife "down the road" and even took their parents' mutual savings to buy that woman a farm. "Herman and Bertha Krause came over and said "Pauline, you just have to get a divorce!" [10] Note: the divorce was in 1924; Bertha died in 1917. [2]

Note: his second wife's obit says they were married in 1920 [16] His second wife was so cute and neat and prim. When she was old and a widow, the Tollas' called on her. She was just changing her clothes for the afternoon - having difficulty getting her stockings on. She remarked, "I don't know if my legs are getting longer or my arms shorter!" [11]

His second wife Pauline was just as nice as the other one was bad. This wife's children were good to August. [1]

Letter from Martha Krause Rice to her cousin Elsie Krause Brown vacationing in Florida, 26 JAN 1949 [24]

... Suppose you heard that Uncel August passed on. His funeral was yesterday... Rev. Kuhn conducted a beautiful service. All of us felt we brought a great deal home with us. Martha is going to stay with Aunt Pauline for awhile. The dear soul doesn't want to give her home up and who can blame her. It may not surprise you to know that Uncle August's children were at the services and called on the funeral home as well as sent flowers. What a time to make an appearance, but the family were pleased knowing how much Uncle August would of appreciated their recognition."

In 1982, the children of his daughter Martha were brought to court concerning money they had swindled out of their aunt Alma. This money belonged to Alma, Emma, and Minnie. Emma had loaned a total of \$45,000 to Alma which Alma gave to the nieces and nephews. [10]

But he had a a revolver and shot one crook in the foot while Herman whipped the horse to St. Joe. [1,4-6,9,12,18] See story told by his daughter Mabel.

When the kids were young and they lived on the farm, Anna used to clean all of their woolen and unwashable clothes with Naptha, an explosive liquid, as did most women in that day. Then when she was finished she would throw the old Naptha down a hole of their outside privy so that the kids and animals and chickens wouldn't get into it. One day after this usual process, Herman, went into the privy to use it not knowing the Naptha had been thrown in. It was his habit to sit down and read a bit, and usually light up his pipe for a smoke. This is what he did then. The next thing they all heard an explosion. Anna and the girls ran outside to find Herman on the ground outside the privy. "Herman, Herman, what happened to you?" cried Anna. "Well, I don't know" said Herman picking himself up -- "I guess it was something I ate!" [11]

The kids had a fun childhood. Anna used to let the girls make three cakes every Saturday and then all young people in the area were welcome Saturday nights. They would make home made ice cream with everyone taking a turn stirring it. Agnes would play the piano and they would all sing or dance. [11]

Herman and Mary were married by Rev. F. C. Schmidt. Witnesses were Herman and Bertha Hinz. [18]

He was baptized August Herman. He was confirmed in the Evangelical Lutheran Church of St. Joseph, MI, on April 13, 1884. [4-5]

He was a Mason Mason in Lodge #437 (St. Joseph, MI). [22]

When he would come home drunk from town, his daughter would run across the farm fields to get her Uncle Tad, Herman's brother. Tad was the only one who could calm Herman down. Elsie said that Herman would throw things such as her mother's good dishes when he was drunk and that was why she (Elsie) did not have nice dishes that had been her mother's. [13]

In 1918 Schultz and Hassle won the contract to pave a state reward road through Baroda. They used a slag foundation, number one Barr bricks, and an asphalt sealer. Their total bill to the village was \$5, 663.80. His road building company continued in the family for many years, and later bacame Schultz Roofing. [14]

Theodore Krause, Berrien Farmer, Dies Wednesday [7]

Theodore Krause, 69, prominent Berrien township farmer died at 7:15 p.m., Wednesday at his home after an illness of a week. He had been an invalid for the past several years and had been confined to his bed much of the time. Death was due to a heart condition.

Born in Germany August 26, 1873, Mr. Krause came to this country when seven years of age. He had been a resident of Berrien township, living on his present farm, for the past 26 years.

In 1899, he married Emma Schultz in St. Joseph.

Active in Republician politics in his community, he was a former justice of peace in Berrien township, and a member of the township school board.

When she was about three years old and the family was staying at the Ewalds after arriving in the USA, her brother Paul accidently chopped off the tip of her finger with a hatchet. [3]

She was confirmed in Trinity Luth. Ch, St. Joseph, on 13 APR 1897. [11] She worked at Cooper Wells factory. [1]

She was a big one to make a wish and break the bird's wishbone. [2] She would say: "Rub your mother's wedding band on a sty and it will go away."

"Don't two people dry on the same towel or you're going to have a fight."

"Every white spot on your nail is for a lie you told. " [2]

"Aunt Marty Tietz was the youngest of the Schultz family. She stayed home with her mother, Great Grandma Henrietta Schultz, to care for her until she died. Uncle Will courted Aunt Marty for years. She finally married him after her mother died. Aunt Marty therefore inherited her mother's things -- the house I don't know about. But Aunt Marty really shared with my mother and me. Doris and Elaine Siewert also received. When Marty died Minnie Siewert, her niece and living companion for years, inherited her personal items. The house went to the county for Marty's long care." Fern Brown Graber [2]

Witnesses to her marriage were Herbert Tollas and Minnie Knuth. [9] When Marty was pregnant she fell from a chair which she was standing on to hang curtains. She almost died then. The doctor had to take the child using her kitchen table for an operating table - no anesthetic. The baby was not buried. Soon after, she began to have rheumatism starting in her ankles. She later developed arthritis crippling her. Marty was much like a grandmother to Fern Brown as Fern only lived two houses down the street in Baroda. [2]

"Aunt Martha has had a pitiful life, - really! I can't ever think of any time she sat in a garden of roses, so to speak. Had she had good health - all else would of come to her. I think of her and probably in tow vains [sic] - one being her suffering and the other that I never have to bear her crosses." [18-niece Martha Krause Rice]

40. Carl "Charlie" Schulz

CARL (1867-1943)

Carl, the oldest son of Hermann and Amelia Schwichtenberg Schulz, came to America with his parents and siblings when he was 17 years old. It is known that his parents brought him and his brother, Frank, at age 16 to avoid the military draft. An unknown brother, Ludwig, also was reported on the ship as age 6, along with three sisters, Minna, age 11; Bertha, age 3; and Paulina, age 11 months. Sister Anna was born after their arrival in North Morristown. Carl was known as "Charlie" to the people he associated with in North Morristown. He married his wife, Auguste Liebrenz Schulz, at Trinity Lutheran Church, North Morristown. Auguste emigrated from Brandenburg, Germany, a province east of Pommern, Germany. Carl "Charlie" and Auguste settled down in the Shieldsville Township, North Morristown farming area to raise their five children:

married Paul F. Borchardt

Their children lived in several vicinities. Daughters Franciska "Nancy" (and Hermann) and Emma lived in the Faribault area after their marriage. Before moving to the Faribault area, "Nancy" (and Hermann) farmed in LeSueur County and Emma (and Fred) lived in North Dakota. Louisa lived in the North Morristown farming area with her first husband until his death. She later married Paul F. Borchardt whose first wife, Martha Schwichtenberg, also passed away. Emil lived in the Village of Morristown with his wife Ann; their two children died in childbirth. Emil worked in the Eisert Grocery Store and later was a bank clerk at the Morristown State Bank. The youngest son of Carl and Auguste, Arthur (and Alma) lived St. Paul, MN where he owned and operated a barber shop on Snelling Avenue.

Linda Schultz Strub, granddaughter of Arthur (and Alma) Schultz, recorded the following information about her grandfather:

"Arthur, the youngest of the children, began work on the sixty-acre farm when he was seven years old. He can recall many incidents of his childhood, but memories of a more permanent nature are those which he

experienced every day that he walked the 2 1/2 (or 5 miles round trip) miles to the small, one-room Trinity Lutheran School in North Morristown. While talking with Gramp, it became apparent that he enjoyed recalling his experiences in school. Early school days in the small one-room schoolhouse, the presence of a strict teacher who loved to pull ears, and perhaps liked making an example of one unfortunate boy who fell asleep in class, is especially funny to hear, because it enabled me to see the sly, and even crafty gleam which appeared in Gramp's eyes. Teachers at this time assumed a greater hold upon students' attitudes and attention span...as was the case of one poor student who found that a broken off horsewhip still had some purpose and could not be considered useless.

Students seemed more apt for mischief and during this period this seemed to be at a maximum. Spitballs were a favorite and as this activity could not go unpunished the teacher sent the boys, as well as the girls (who enjoyed spitballs just as much or even more) into the coat hall. After a sufficient length of time, the students were summoned, but one strange thing occurred, only the boys returned. Being quite puzzled after attempts of sending various messengers which permitted the girls to return also failed, he investigated the situation for himself and found the giggling girls tied hand and foot in the coat hall. The boys, it would seem, were quite ingenious as well as quite busy during their punishment!

It has been found that most children or young adults worked during this time. Money was scarce and in most cases the amount of money earned by the children was welcomed and of course lightened the burden of supporting a working child..and therefore made the money go farther among children who were too young to support themselves.

Arthur Schultz and Alma Zoske were later married, after a seven year courtship and hours of memorable experiences. They lived and worked on the farm in Rice County for a few more years and during this time their little Kody (Kurt) was born. He was unable to speak English until he started school. He was a natural born farmer, although sometimes Grandma would have liked to have disowned him for his cute, yet destructive actions. And later Ardella Bertha Augusta was born.

The Schultz' later moved to St. Paul where Arthur became a master barber and established a shop on Snelling Avenue where he carried on a business after thirty-five years in the same location. A change also occurred in the spelling of the Schulz name. It began to be spelled "Schultz." It wasn't determined when this came into existence, except that it was in use after the Schultz' moved to St. Paul."

Carl "Charlie" and Auguste Liebrenz Schulz were members of Trinity Lutheran Church, North Morristown with interment at Concordia Cemetery, North Morristown after their death at age 76 and 74, respectively. Their son, Arthur (and Alma) were also interred at Concordia Cemetery after their death in St. Paul, MN.

41. Frank Schultz

FRANK (1868-1948)

Frank, the second son of Hermann and Amelia Schwichtenberg Schulz, was also born in Pommern, Germany emigrating to America at age 16. He, along with his brother, Carl, were brought to America to avoid the Prussian Army draft. Frank married Emelia Hamele on December 31, 1895 in Trinity Lutheran Church, North Morristown. Emelia was born in Micalsdorf, Austria. They also farmed in the North Morristown area and moved to Waterville, MN when their son, Leo (and Dorothy) farmed the family farm. They were blessed with seven children, five of whom reached adulthood:

Rudolph.....(1913-1988)....married Leona Schulz, 1938................2 sons and 2 daughters

Their oldest son, William (and Dora) resided in St. Paul, MN where he worked as a carpenter and steam engineer. The following excerpt was taken from the Wegner Genealogy Book:

"Never written 'William Frank Schulz', just 'William F. Schulz.' family he was 'Dad'! To anyone who knew and loved him, 'Bill'. Can't remember anyone ever calling him 'William'. Never knew anyone who didn't like or respect him. Gentle, good sense of humor and a laugh that brought tears to his eyes when he chose to use it. Loved baseball and hockey games. Modeled his Christian faith and values. Faithful, patient servant of the Lord - a lifetime tither. He enjoyed the outdoors! Hunted geese, pheasants, ducks, squirrels, and rabbits; fished lakes by trolling, still and spear fishing when it was still legal from ice houses. A wood working craftsman!! Excellent home builder and cabinet maker. Ingenious! He designed and created whatever was needed to solve a problem, to build or repair things of wood and metal. Generous, tenderhearted. Strong but quiet faith in God. Nurtured his life plan, "As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord." Never wasted anything. Made a rich life with the many gifts God gave him. Demonstrated how to make life a God-pleasing, respectable experience."

One son, Walter (and Ida) lived in Waterville, MN where he was a barber. Their only son, Melvin (and Eva) now live in Sun City, AZ. Dave Schulz, son of Melvin and Eva, is a local artist in Phoenix, AZ. Dave Schulz designed and painted the Icon Altar Cross at Trinity Lutheran Church, Phoenix, AZ.

Son Leo lived on the family farm most of his life. After he married Dorothy Lok, they lived east of Faribault on a farm for three years and then returned to the family farm in 1935. His father, Frank, sold him the farm in 1948. They were active members of Trinity Lutheran Church, North Morristown and honorary members of the Fellowship Club. They moved to Warsaw, MN in 1980 from their Morristown Township farm. Their son,

Edgar, (and Ione) also farmed in the Morristown area, and, son, Roger worked as a mechanic at McQuay's in Faribault for 43 years before retirement.

Their youngest son, Rudolph, "Rudy" as his friends and family knew him, graduated from Dr. Martin Luther College, Ulm, MN and taught in Lutheran schools in Minnesota (Plato, Rochester, Fox Lake) and in Wisconsin (South Milwaukee, Rhinelander). Retiring in 1955 after teaching 20 years, he and his family returned to Oak Creek, WI and was employed at Kyle Products, South Milwaukee until his retirement and move to Racine, WI in 1978. "He was an excellent carpenter and home builder as well. He was extraordinarily talented in music and played organ for many years at Oakwood Lutheran Church, Oak Creek, WI. His favorite pastime was fishing," notes his daughter, Eunice Schulz Menk. Rudy's wife, Leona, is now living in Milwaukee, WI after his death on November 7, 1988 in Racine, WI, buried at Forest Hill Cemetery, Oak Creek, WI.

Their only surviving daughter, Gertrude, married Rev. Otto F. Krause and served parishes with him in Stover, MO; Dorset, MN; Janesville, MN; and Fairmont, MN. At age 94 she is living with her daughter, Donna Lietz in Oak Park, IL due to frail health. However, she had lived in her Fairmont home until December 1998.

Frank and Emelia retired from farming in 1935 and moved to Waterville, MN, five miles west of Morristown, MN. They are buried at Concordia Cemetery, North Morristown, MN and died in Waterville, MN. Emelia died in 1945 at age 67, and Frank died in 1948 at age 70.

45. Pauline Alvina Schulz

PAULINE (1883-1969)

Pauline was born in Pommern, Germany, probably in Kreis Stolp north of Kreis Rummelsburg. She was almost one year old when crossing the Atlantic Ocean aboard the Braunschweig Ship, reported as 11 months on the ship list from the National Archives, Washington, DC. She arrived in Baltimore, MD on April 17, 1884 with brothers and sisters, Carl (18), Franz (16), Minna (11), Ludwig (6), and Bertha (3). Her parents, Hermann and Amelia Schwichtenberg Schulz, dreaded the thought of being buried in the ocean if death should occur while on the ocean. Their last child, Anna born on August 20, 1884, in Shieldsville Township, Rice County, MN. Pauline and Anna married brothers Carl and Paul Glende, Sr., sons of August and Elbertine Seils Glende who emigrated from Gr. Krien (Grossegreen), Kreis Stolp, Pommern, Germany, which was about five miles from Stolp, Pommern, a large city.

Carl and Pauline Schulz Glende lived two miles west of her folks, the Schulz Family in the North Morristown farming community. Carl and Pauline Schulz Glende were blessed with a large family of ten children, including twins:

Professor Arthur Glende wrote the following account of his parents and their life style:

"During the time of the early German settlements, not all the time was spent in isolation within one's own family group. There was time for joy and merriment when one group of settlers would visit another group and play games or just reminisce about the life as it was lived in the "Old Country." Whenever help was required in the building of the house or barn, neighbors would often congregate to help in the "house raising bee" of "barn raising bee." The women folk would provide the "pot luck" meals. They also would be the spectators, cheering on the men as they applied the hammer and the saws. As a rule when the house or barn was finished there was the usual celebration with music and square dancing, the entire neighborhood having been invited. Whether or not it was a celebration that the Schulz and the Glende families became acquainted one can only speculate. But this we know that a young man by the name of Carl Glende (our dad) became very much attracted to a beautiful young girl by the name of Pauline Schulz (our mother) and after a time of courtship married her. This meant of course the establishment of another homestead where the young couple could live and raise a family of their own. After searching for a place of their own, they decided to purchase a 40 acre site, only two or three miles away from both of their parents in case they needed help or advice. This farm site was located on the northwest fringe of the German settlement. The Irish settlement was to the immediate northwest with Kilkenny as its center. A large Bohemian settlement was located to the northeast with Montgomery as its area of concentration."

The large family of Pauline and Carl must have been a joy to Amelia and Hermann Schulz, along with their other children's families. Daughter Lillian Glende Wildberg noted, "Mom spoke of how her parents worked on the farms in Germany. After their work was done for the day, the neighbors would gather to visit and sing and have real fellowship together. In America they missed the fellowship they enjoyed in Germany."

Today the surviving family members of Pauline and Carl are Louise Lorenz, Lillian Wildberg, Arthur Glende, and Donald Glende. Donald's twin

brother, Ronald, died tragically while he stopped during a blinding snowstorm to help a stranded motorist. He was hit by a semi-truck and died instantly. The family farm is operated by Donald (and Joan) and members of their family at this time. Louise (and Herman) Lorenz and family farmed in the Waterville area; Louise is now in the Waterville Good Samaritan Care Center where she participates in church services and daily devotions. Lillian (and Orlon) Wildberg reside in Minnetonka, MN and celebrated their Golden Anniversary at Trinity Lutheran Church, North Morristown last summer in 1998. Professor Arthur Glende was professor at Dr. Martin Luther College in New Ulm, MN where he is now retired with his wife, Ruth.

Deceased family members lived in the Faribault, Morristown, and Waterville areas. The Eberhardt Glende family lived in Faribault, along with the Elsie (and Edwin) Smuda family. Lydia, Eberhardt's wife, is living with her son, Glen, in Faribault today. Elsie and Edwin Smuda are deceased. The Smuda's were blessed with twins, Harry and Harriet, as were the Lorenz', Janet and Jeanette. Gertrude (and Erich) Velzke and family lived in the North Morristown farming community and are both deceased. The home of Erna (and Arthur) Preuss was in the Waterville farming area.

When Carl became ill with pneumonia resulting in his death in 1941, the operation of the family farm was left to the task of Pauline and her daughter Lillian, age 17, and the twins, age 14. After Ronald's untimely death, the responsibility of running the farm became Pauline's along with Donald and his wife, Joan. "For most of us only treasured memories remain of the place of our birth, the days of our childhood, and the loving care and guidance of our Christian parents," notes Arthur.

Daughter Lillian writes the following account of her mother's last days:

"Mother was always easy to live with, so appreciative of the favors we could do for her. She was always more concerned with the welfare of others than of herself. Even the last day of her hospitalization she ate her supper and was concerned that I would also have something to eat. This last meal was on the evening of August 19, 1969, in the Faribault hospital. On the following day, August 20, 1969, the Lord called her to her eternal rest in heaven."

Pauline's obituary in the Faribault Daily News states she was born May 27, 1883. However, there are differences in records of her birth date including that on her grave site at Concordia Cemetery with her husband, Carl Glende.

46. Anna Friederike Schulz

ANNA (1884-1965)

Anna, the youngest child of Hermann and Amelia Schwichtenberg Schulz, was born August 20, 1884, five months after they arrived in America on April 17, 1884. She was a year plus younger than her sister, Pauline. It is interesting to note again that two sisters married two brothers. Anna married Paul Glende in 1902, two years after her sister, Pauline, married Carl Glende. Anna and Paul Glende settled on a farm in the southwest corner of Shieldsville Township, Rice County, Minnesota. They bought

this 80-acre farm from Seth Kenney for \$2,000. Half of the farm was in LeSueur County and half was in Rice County. They adopted one son, Paul, Jr., before they had their own children. After this they had eight children of their own:

Paul Glende, Sr. died from influenza during the flu epidemic of 1918. His youngest son, Emil, was only seven days old when this happened. Paul, Sr. was buried on the same day that he died because people were afraid of getting the flu; it was very contagious. The only ones present at Paul's funeral were the family members and just a couple of the neighbors. Paul's father, August, died of a heart attack the day after Paul died. A memorial service was held at a later date for Paul and August together.

Paul's widow, Anna, and her children farmed until 1928 when she sold the farm and later moved to Faribault, MN. She married Otto Spitzack while living in Faribault. Paul was 35 years old when he succumbed to the flu, and Anna lived to be 81 years of age in Faribault.

The children of Paul and Anna Glende resided in Faribault, MN and the surrounding farm community in Rice County their married life except for Emil and Alma. Emil lived in Morro Bay, CA with his wife, Patricia, and died in Cayoucos, CA in 1986. His first wife, Connie, died in Owatonna, MN in 1972. Emil worked for the Josten Company for 27 years before retiring. George (and Leona) and Arnold (and Minnie) eventually established the Glende carpentry business with Arnold's son, Dale, after working for William Wegner as a carpenter for several years. Paul, Jr., their adopted son, was employed at the Nutting Truck and Caster Company foundry for over 19 years until his retirement and death in 1986.

Ervin (and Velma) farmed in different locations in Rice County until they settled on a farm in the northwest corner of section 18 of Wheeling Township. They and their neighbors and relatives worked together in threshing bees and harvesting bees for many years. Ervin also did a lot

of custom farm work: baling hay, threshing grain, silo-filling, and corn-picking. He was the only son to continue in his father's footsteps as a farmer.

Three of their four daughters are living today, Alma, Erna, and Hilda. Alma is a widow, living in Phoenix, AZ, and Erna and Hilda are residing together in the Faribault Health & Rehabilitation Center. Sister Edna worked for over fifteen years at Wilson & Company and for six years at Treasure Cave in Faribault before her death in 1984. In Memorium, Edna's family submitted the following tribute: Who died one year ago today, God saw that she was getting tired and a cure was not to be. So He put His arms around her and whispered, "Come with me." With tearful eyes we watched her suffer and saw her fade away. Although we couldn't bear to lose her, we could not bid her stay. A golden heart stopped beating, hard working hands laid to rest. God broke our hearts to prove to us He only takes the best.

Paul & Anna Glende are buried in Concordia Cemetery, North Morristown, MN where Anna's second husband, Otto Spitzack, is also interred.

After 36 years in Illinois, Joan Schmidt returned to her childhood home on River Bluff, Niles, and added a second story to the 1930s bungalow where she now lives with her mother, Dorothy.

This home has undergone many changes. The home was built in the 1930s and was purchased by my parents in 1941 for \$1,500. It was a two-bedroom bungalow. A new well and indoor plumbing were added immediately, and the house was remodeled, the living room and kitchen areas expanded. Dad (Walter) dug by hand the basements for the additions. I can recall as a child tearing off lathe and plaster, and taking nails out of boards.

"In June 2000, I retired from a 36-year career in education in Illinois and decided to return to Michigan. After talking with my sister and determining that living with my widowed mother was the best option, we checked into the feasibility of adding a second story to our family home.

"I wanted to add living and closet space but to retain the basic floor plan of the original house as well as the plastered walls and arched passageways. Upstairs I have a bedroom and office, a huge bathroom, lots of closets and a balcony. -- Joan Schmidt

I remember when we moved in, it was like the country. There was no indoor plumbing, and we shared a well with a neighbor. We had an outhouse, a two-holer, and a hand pump inside. Our house payment was \$15 a month.

"Back then, this was the main highway that went by the house, (U.S.) 31. We'd have bums come up from the highway, begging for food, and our Irish setter would bring them right up to the door.

"We were always talking about adding on, but we never did. I thought it was a good idea when my daughters suggested it. I'm glad it's staying in the family. -- Dorothy Schmidt

Fern Brown Graber is at home, 52690 Brooktrails Drive, South Bend,

Indiana, and her mother, Elsie Krause Brown, is at Healthwin Hospital in South Bend telling the following of her Christmas holiday memories as a child back home on the farm in Scotdale, Michigan. Fern quizzed her mother and her memory was good that day. By the 22nd when Fern finished this write-up her mother's memory was not good again. Elsie never knew that Fern took notes or ever wrote this up. Elsie said "My, I enjoyed your visit!"

We always had a school Christmas program that our parents came to. At school we had a tree. The teacher usually gave us a gift, too. Sunday School program was always Christmas Eve at the Scotdale Church. We would go to these programs in a horse drawn sleigh. We had a big sleigh that the team of horses had to be used for. The cutter, that was stored in the barn all year, was gotten out, too. It only required one horse. Both always had bells on them. We covered up with blankets and a heavy robe to keep warm. Sometimes we heated up bricks to put in the sleigh. I usually got to wear a brown beaver muff and a collar piece that fitted over my cloth coats. Uncle Otto Krause gave them to me. guess he liked my pretty well. He gave me a couple of fur sets. He was still a bachelor living at home with Grandma and Grandpa Carl Krause on the homestead place. That set of grandparents gave me most of my Christmas toys I guess. The other Schultz grandparents by then had too many grandchildren to buy for all of us. I remember one especially pretty red sweater Grandma and Grandpa Krause gave me, too -- the kind that buttoned down the front. They gave me the cutest little wooden bureau (or dresser). It was about 15 inches high and 18 inches wide with a few drawers and an attached mirror framed in wood. I really played with that! I wonder what became of it? I wish Cindy could have it. also had like a metal kitchen wall to play with. My little set of china dishes were green and white figured. I never had any of the pressed glass dishes like the little punch bowls, etc. that I can remember. But I did have iron pots and pans to play with. I also had a little flat iron - no trivet though. We always had it in the toy basket at Fair Plain for kids to play with that came over to visit. It disappeared. The dolls that I remember having were without hair -- just painted on. They weren't china head ones, except one that I broke! The others were metal heads, I guess, with painted faces. The bodies were probably all cloth bodies. My doll buggy was really elegant! It had wooden wheels. The body was woven like with ribbon parts to hold it. The canopy top was like a pretty umbrella! It opened and closed! I used to put kittens and puppies in it as well as my dolls. One year Stanley got a pair of rocking horses with one horse on each side. It was wooden. He was probably three years old. He could sit in it. It was real cute and was he pleased. I also remember him getting a toy gun once and when he was older a baseball and glove. We both would hang our own stockings, not fancy ones like they have now, on Christmas eve, but for the like of me, I can't remember where we hung or put them. We'd usually get an orange, some uncracked nuts, jaw breaker candies and maybe a pair of mittens in We never ran downstairs fast on Christmas morning as we slept downstairs, too, when we were little and it was so cold. But we hurried in by the tree. The tree was a real tree Dad got somewhere. It always stood in the front parlor in that big front window. It had candles on it which we lit sometimes. The BIG tree at the church also had candles on

it. They lit them there on Christmas Eve and someone always sat behind it with pails of water in case of fire. Mr. Sanders, the Sunday School Superintendant did it sometimes and so did Bill Bartz's father. We'd get a net-like stocking at the church services. Our candles on our tree at home were twisted and all different colors. We had tinsel strung around the tree at home by the yards -- also made colored paper chains for the tree. We always strung popcorn for the tree -- and sometimes cranberries, too! Mother liked to pop corn, but I don't ever remember her making popcorn balls. She made sugar cookies -- never had a cutter, just used different sized glasses. She never did any knitting either as I can remember. She did some sewing for us.

We believed in Santa Claus and Mom and Dad had us being good for him far ahead! One year we all went over to Aunt Emma and Uncle Tad's for Christmas dinner. I was about 6 and Stanley about 3 or 4 years old, I'd guess. They lived across the fields then from our farm. After dinner, all of a sudden Santa came in in a mask and beard and a long raincoat like affair! He had gifts for Stanley and me and all of Aunt Emma's kids she had then! Were we excited. Later on my Dad came in from outside. We didn't know then it was my Dad who had played Santa to us!

We had Christmas dinners at different homes taking turns. it was at Aunt Emma and Uncle Tad's, sometimes at my folks, and sometimes at Grandma and Grandpa Carl Krauses at the homestead. Will and Otto weren't married yet at this time. The Christmas a few days after my mother's death was a very sad one. Aunt Tilda Taube invited us all over. Dad said it wasn't right to go celebrate. But Stanley and I went leaving stubborn Dad home to his memories and perhaps his conscience on how hard he'd been on Mom at times. By that time transportation was easier so we could get together with the Taubes in Benton Harbor. Most of the Krause and Schultz families had a Christmas tree, but I can't remember much about other decorations. Both of my Grandmothers had those old type woven red and cream figured tablecloths. There never was punch at the Krauses at Christmas. Grandma Minnie was so against liquor! I don't ever remember having turkey -- it was usually a large goose or chickens, noodles, mashed potatoes, a vegetable, not much salad as there wasn't any lettuce available then -- it would have been cabbage coleslaw, pickles and such, cranbetties if available and pies -- usually apple, pumpkin, or They made their own mince meat with pork then. mince.

We never were invited for New Years dinner -- the invitation was just understood by all of the Schultz families to come to Grandma Henrietta and Grandpa Martin Schultz's home down by Silver Beach in St. Joseph. You see, it was also Grandma Schult'z birthday, too! Aunt Marty, cousin Minnie (who both lived at home) and Grandma herself must have cooked all of the days from Christmas till New Years for all of those families! They only had a big living room, one bedroom, a big kitchen with a cistern pump and a big black cookstove in it with a big adjoining pantry downstairs. There were aunts, uncles, and cousins all over the place and outside playing, too. Did we all look forward to that day! Why we had to eat at Grandma's big table with all of the leaves in it in 4 or 5, no maybe 6 shifts! Every family brought Grandma a nice gift that day for her birthday and that's how she happened to have some lovely dishes! She and Grandpa never gave gifts to all of the family for Christmas -- just that New Years dinner as the family just got too large. I guess originally Grandma, Marty and Minnie did do some sewing or knitting or

The reason they probably didn't have a wedding picture taken was the stormy weather and that photographers weren't open. She did not keep the dress. [11,13]

Bill Bartz and his wife gave a wedding shower for Elsie and Forrest. The guests together gave them a crystal lamp (like is pictured in this history). It no longer exists. [13]

Elsie's first set of good china was a white and pink rose pattern of Carrollton China which she purchased from her Aunt Marty Tietz. Only two bowls were left by the time Cindy had them. They were chipped and discolored, so she did not keep them, but took pictures. [8,13]

Elsie canned food using the open kettle method. She also used the cold pack method with a granite canner with a rack in it to hold the jars. She would can chicken, meats, sausages, beans (green, wax, lima), peas, beets, corn, peaches, pears, applesauce, cherries (sour, sweet white, bing), strawberries, raspberries (red, black), dew berries, plums, grape juice, tomatoes, tomato juice, pickles (dill, sweet, bread and butter), pickle relish, pickled sycle pears, pickled peaches, pickled string beans, pickled watermelon rind, pickled cantaloup, pickled corn relish, and pickled beets. She made currant, cherry, and grape jelly; red raspberry, strawberry, and grape jam; peach and plum spreads. She was proud of her fruit cellar with it's shelves of the pretty colored canned items all neatly lined up. She had a big homey

Once when Bub came over to the house to visit the door was open and he heard Elsie playing the piano. He said she played nicely, but would not play if people were around. She did not have a lot of sheet music, but three pieces Bub remembered were: Sailing Down the Chesapeake Bay, When You Wore A Tulip and I Wore A Big Red Rose, and Call Me Up Some Rainy Afternoon. [27]

Once when my mother, Elsie, was spring house cleaning she'd taken the cushions out of the maple frame sun room furniture. Having the habit of

sitting and listening to the radio news she did so - falling through to the floor - feet up and couldn't get up. Good thing I was living at home yet. [Fern - 13]

Two Local Women Hurt In Crackup [33]

A Benton Harbor woman and her 26-year-old daughter escaped serious injuries late yesterday afternoon when they were thrown from an auto in a collision near Arden.

The victims were Mrs. Elsie Brown, 56, and Miss Fern Brown, 26, both of 2294 Colfax avenue. They were taken to Memorial hospital for treatment of bruises and shock. Both were released after they received first aid.

Deputy Marvin Washington said Miss Brown was at the wheel of an auto which struck the rear of one driven by John P. Sundquist, 36, a minister at Emmanuel Missionary college.

Sundquist had halted his car to wait for a school bus to discharge children when the collision occurred, Deputy Washington said.

I called her Grammie. [Cindy - 8]

In 1963, Elsie had kidneys stones which required surgery. She was given only a 50% chance of surviving the surgery. [13]

On March 23, 1970, she gave power of attorney to her daughter Fern. [15]

The [birthday] card can say the words much better then I can. I would like to say how much our friendship to me has met over the years. That I can tell you so while we both are still here on this earth. - Frances Welsh [31]

Elsie came with Elmer's mother and step-father for Christmas 1975 at her daughter Fern's home in South Bend, IN. When they took her back home to her apartment she decided to come back outside to wave good-bye to them. That is when she fell and broke her pelvis. After the stay in the hospital in Michigan she then went to Healthwin Hospital only a about a mile from where Fern lived. It had the skilled nursing she needed at first. When Elsie was over the broken pelvis Fern and she looked at other nursing homes, but Elsie said she preferred to stay at Healthwin. It was after Elsie fell that Fern found out how confused her mother sometimes could be. It was then that cousins Martha and Edna told Fern that Elsie had once called one of them very upset that she had misplaced her school homework and with other confused stories at times. Fern also found when cleaning out Elsie's apartment that a few pans were scorched (apparently Elsie forgot them on the stove). Later in her confusion, she often thought Cindy was still very young or other times that she and Forrest were vacationing in Florida. Fern saved a couple of letters she wrote to people (but Fern did not mail) in which she was thinking this way. [8]

The Death of my Mother, Elsie E. Brown [5]

In the morning of March 24th 1980 I was hurrying around at my home 52690 Brooktrails Drive South Bend, Ind., to go to Healthwin Hospital which is about one mile from my home. It was about 10:45 when the phone rang as I was just about ready to leave. Visiting hours started at 11:00 AM. I had already called to see how my mother's condition was as it was not good the night before. Mom had pneumonia and was unable to cough

much due to the degenerated condition of her back from osteoporosis. Her pelvis, hip, knee and ankle previously had broken because of the decalcification. She also had hardening of the arteries badly. Her memory and mind were not clear hardly at all the previous four years. However, for the last two weeks God had been good to us all and her mind was clear. Cynthia, my daughter, had been home on spring break from Purdue University the week before. She knew her. Previously she still thought of Cindy as a little girl and didn't know her grown up. She'd ask, "Who's staying with Cindy?"

It was Mrs. Bird, the nurse at Healthwin calling to tell me I'd better come right over as my mother was very bad. I left immediately.

When I walked into my Mother's room Mom was gasping for her breath, making gurgling sounds. I sat down beside her, kissed her, and took one of her hands saying, "Hi, Mom, I'm here." She said "Oh, Fern, I'm so glad. I'm going to die today." Now even if you're expecting it, it's a shock to have your mother tell you that! I said, "What do you want me to do, Mama?" "Just stay with me!" I offered to read from her well worn bible. She wanted that. So I did. Then we said The Lord's Prayer and the 23rd Psalm together. Now as well as I know them, I was so shook up that she's the one whe led them.

I called Elmer, my husband at 12:00 at his office. He was over by 1:00 and stayed all day with us. Cynthia was at Purdue.

It was a very rough day! Her breathing was labored. The nurses were so nice. They knew her so well as she'd been there since January 1976. She, in her sweet way helped them with other sicker patients when she was able to be up.

Since Elmer and I hadn't eaten since breakfast, I drove home about 5:00, let Biscuit, the dog, out and fixed some supper. I ate and returned to Healthwin so Elmer could go home to eat, too. Mom was glad Elmer was with us as he'd always been the son she never had.

Visiting hours were over at 8:30. Elmer asked me if I wanted to go home. The nurses couldn't tell us either how long it might be though we all thought it couldn't be much longer. I'm so glad we decided to stay.

My mother began asking the nurses and me for her clothes. "I've got to get dressed!" (She hadn't dressed in about a year or more.) We kept telling her, "You're in a hospital and don't need your clothes." She kept insisting about her clothes. Finally she said, "Oh, Fern that man is here!" I said, "Do you mean Elmer?" "No, that man." "Do you mean Daddy (as she spoke of him often)?"

"NO, that Wonderful Man is here!"

And she was gone. Elmer said "That's it, Fern. It's all over now."

- I just cried and said, "Thank you, Jesus. She suffered long enough."
- I fully believe in my heart that it was her Lord Jesus Christ that came for her. I felt his near presence, too.

Elsie's will dated July 5, 1978, gave all of her estate to be held in trust to her daughter Fern and granddaughter Cynthia. Fern was aware of certain people and charities to which Elsie wanted some of her money to go. After Elsie died, Fern saw to it that these people and charities received the money. [13,16]

Forrest worked as an engineer while Lester was a pilot. Forrest always
loved the sea and ships. He started sailing in 1914 and was a member of
the Merchant Marines during WWI. While on ship in October he got the bad
```

1918 flu and entered a hospital at Ste. St. Marie to recover. His father had it at home at the very same time, so Lester went home to help nurse the father with round the clock sips of strong whiskey, which was about the only thing they had to give then. After sailing the Great Lakes on several ships such as the SS Copp of the Bolland & Cornelius Steamship line for seven years, Forrest had to give up sailing in 1921 as he developed a cronic ear mastoid. This condition greatly upset his sense of balance, and therefore he became violently seasick. Forrest OFTEN spoke to Fern of his sailing days and experiences. He'd take her down to Lake Michigan (only a couple of miles from their home) to watch the many moods of the lake or the glorious sunsets. Then he'd often say, "Red in the morning, sailors' warning; Red at night, sailors' delight." predicted the weather. On Sundays after church they many times drove past the docks to see what ships were moored there. Sometimes one would be in that he had sailed on or one he knew the crew of. They would take Elsie home to fix dinner as she disliked ships and water. Then Forrest and Fern would go back to visit the ship. Fern met many old fellow crewmen of Forrest's and toured many ships that way. She would politely listen while he tried his darnest to explain how the engines worked when they were in the engine room. But somehow, the huge pans of strawberries or whatever the cooks were preparing interested her more. Sailors usually eat very well, as its one of the draws to getting a good crew. lot of crews are pretty tough fellows - many prone to drinking up their high salaries when in port. Forrest was not a drinker. Fern recalls him telling of the many times the captain had him go around emptying the crew's bottles brought on ship so that they could sober up enough to be able to leave port again. Forrest talked to Fern of them possibly working together (one time trip) on a ship to South America - he as an engineer and she as a waitress or maid. [3]

How he met Elsie: Elsie was visiting her aunt and uncle (Marty and Will Tietz) in Baroda. Uncle Will asked Forrest to give Elsie a ride part way home. He did. When he called for a date, Elsie said no, but later thought it over and wrote to Forrest. They dated about three years. courted Elsie in Model Ts. He would drive every Sunday from Baroda to Scotdale (about 10 miles). For their dates they usually went to St. Joseph for a movie and supper or to South Bend for the same. Philadelphia Restaurant was their favorite spot for ice cream or supper. Fern had the old woolen lap robe they used to keep warm with as Model T's did not have a heater. They were married by Rev. F. C. Schmidt in the Zion Evangelical Church parsonage on Harrison Avenue in St. Joseph on a snowy, stormy, winter Wednesday evening. Her brother, Stanley, and her cousin, Edna Krause, were the witnesses. Forrest was able to get Elsie a lovely pink flower bouquet. Elsie wore a beige lace flapper dress and hat. No pictures were taken as they wondered if the Model T would even get the wedding party back from St. Joseph to Scotdale in the storm. [3-4]

The early winter of 1926-1927 he and Elsie took a trip from Baroda to St. Petersburg, FL, where his uncle Charles Brown lived. The car did not have a trunk to store clothes or anything, so a black trunk (Fern still

has) was strapped onto the back. Forrest was forever patching tires especially in the mountains of Kentucky and Tennessee or when they forded creek beds. An axe was used a few times to cut trees or limbs blown down on the dirt roads. They got stuck in the red Georgia mud and Elsie wondered if everything would ever get clean again. Fern was conceived on this trip to Florida. [3]

They took other trips to Florida also - staying in St. Petersburg where other Brown relatives lived. One trip included FEB 1940, FEB 1949. [3, 41]

Newspaper 16 DEC 1929 [29]

Mr. and Mrs. Forrest Brown and daughter and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bihlmire have left for Florida to spend several months in St. Petersburg.

He often confused the words did and done. Later, when he knew better he did it on purpose to irritate his daughter. [3]

He sometimes called Fern "Schnickel-fritz." Schnickel-fritz was one of the rarest dolls by toymaker Albert Schoenhut. It was a young boy in a sailor suit made 1919 to 1925. [3]

After placing an order for new cars and receiving notice that the order was ready, an excursion was planned. Everyone but a skeleton work force were recruited plus extra hired men. There had to be one man per car ordered to go over to Dearborn to each drive a new car back to Baroda. Sometimes they drove over (but then one man needed to drive that car back). Other times they boarded a train from Baroda, but then needed to go to Chicago to get another train to Dearborn. [3]

Nelson Schultz said the speed limit around Baroda like on Lemon Creek Road in the 1920s was 30 miles an hour. Once when Brown Brothers drivers were bringing in almost 40 new Ford's they were all fined for going 40 miles an hour. Cars were not delivered on trucks then, they were driven to dealerships from Detroit. He said all the young fellows were excited to watch the cars come in. [20]

Later, new cars were delivered to dealers in wooden crates in a torn down fashion. The crates were shipped by train from Dearborn to Chicago, and then from Chicago to Baroda. Then the Brown Brothers would reassemble the cars. Luckily, they were located directly across from the Baroda train station. [3]

In order to be able to purchase a car some people would trade in different items towards the purchase. Once in Baroda, they took in a player piano and all of the rolls of music -- also an oriental rug. Once a widowed lady needed a car to be able to go to teach school. She traded in a diamond ring as partial payment. The diamond was the size of a dime -- for a 1934 Ford! [3]

The new Brown Brothers garage in Benton Harbor had lovely new garage fronts on the old car barns that was the parts department. It had about 8 repair stalls, a body repair department, a washing car area, and a storage area. This garage had a black Pittsburgh Plate Glass front with an elegant showroom which had a terrazo floor. Large plants stood around and on a special car showing they added huge floral arrangements. All departments were much larger and grander than the Baroda garage had been. [3]

When it came to making collections on old out standing bills for cars, Forrest usually carried a revolver when trying to collect in the rough "flats" of Benton Harbor. Fern would sometimes go with him. Once when he went into a closed front porch and didn't come out for quite awhile Fern became upset. But he usually came back with some money or the car was repossessed. [3]

By 1936, Ford was using the slogan "Watch the Fords go by!" and using a black scotty dog in their ads. Forrest, Elsie, and Fern took a long trip all through the west to Washington, down the California coast and back home through Texas then north. They drove a 1936 beige Ford four door. On both sides were huge decals of the black scotty and the words, "Watch the Fords go by!" There were no express ways then and they drove through every little town. At first, Fern would slouch down from the back seat in embarrassment when folks would yell, "Watch the Fords go by!", but then she became excited and proud about it and sat up in pride. [3]

Fern and Elsie never quite knew for sure what kind of a car Forrest would drive home. Usually he used one dealer car, but not always. About the time Elsie and Fern really liked a car he sold it. If he picked Fern up from school she would have to really look in the cars for him. Elsie could have had her pick of cars, but she refused to learn to drive. Fern drove as soon as she could. [3]

At one time Brown Brothers had eleven sub-dealers in smaller surrounding towns from their main one in Benton Harbor. They had one in Baroda again, also Bridgman, Watervliet, and St. Joseph. [3]

Brown Brothers made many trips to Dearborn. In the early years the few dealers they had were treated almost like family in the way they entertained them, etc. Golf outings were a popular one and Forrest loved golfing. He golfed along side of Henry Ford once and enjoyed really becoming acquainted with him. [3]

Newspaper MAY 1940 [16]

New construction skyrocketed again during the past week when eight permits totaling \$24,905 were issued at the Benton Harbor municipal building... Largest of the new projects of the past week is the new recreation center building which Brown Bros. now have under construction at 280 West Main street replacing part of the old street car barns which have been razed. It will be a commercial building and will house 11 new bowling alleys under lease to L. M. Craig. The estimated cost is \$15,000.

Newspaper JUL 1940 [16]

The Twin City Recreation bowling alleys, 264 West Main St., will be opened to the public sometime during the week of Aug. 18, it was announced today by Larry Craig, operator and owner. The new alleys will be housed in the one-story brick building recently built by Brown Brothers, former owners of the local Ford agency.

Newspaper AUG 1940 [16]

Twin Cities bowlers will have their first opportunity Saturday afternoon and evening to try their skill on the new Twin City Recreation 14-alley layout, according to Larry Craig, operator and owner. The finishing touches on the huge building erected by the Brown Brothers on

the site of the former street car barns, 280 West Main Street, are expected to be completed by noon tomorrow.

The Old Twin Cities Recreation (last run by his brother, Lester) building at West Main and Ninth Streets in Benton Harbor was sold to Wolf's Marine in 1984. It had 50,000 square feet of floor space. [3,13]

Forrest once walked in one of our garage doors - got in the car on the other side and backed through that closed garage door wrecking it! He came back in the house, sat down in the kitchen, and said "I'll be damned!" [Fern - 3]

"The Death of my Father, Forrest E. Brown" [37]

My father was sort of a semi-invalid for about seven years before he died, though he'd worked hard and led an active life prior to that. He looked healthy for about six of those last seven years though many people, including his brother, Lester Brown and step mother, Louisa Brown thought "it was all in his head". He had a congenital heart condition which never hurt him, but just sapped his strength.

The winter of 1949 he and my mother spent about six weeks in Florida. I was a senior at Western Michigan College where I was doing my home economics practice teaching. When the folks returned from Florida to Benton Harbor in the early spring, Dad took a bad cold. It went into pneumonia. He was in the hospital over Easter. He came home, but never could fully get over it. Finally he had to have oxygen at home all of the time. I came home from college about a week before he died. I sat up with him nights so Mom could get some rest. Dad and I had some good talks. He talked a lot to me, too, with his bright blue eyes.

Finally two days before he died we had to take him to Mercy Hospital in Benton Harbor by ambulance. I'll never forget our Collie dog who'd been so close to him. Collie ran into the bushes with his tail between his legs when the ambulance left. My Aunt Rudy Krause was with us. I said "Aunt Ruby, I don't think my Dad is ever coming home again!" He didn't. He went to his heavenly home.

The day of Dad's death, May 19th 1949, Mom, Aunt Ruby and I went to the hospital to see him that afternoon. He was very ill. I sat side of him a long time -- he just kept talking to me with those blue eyes of his. He seemed to want to just drink me in with them. We had a terrible thunder storm that afternoon.

We went home for supper, leaving Dad with a private duty nurse.

After supper, the three of us went back. The nurse said that Dad had eaten some supper, too, and seemed improved.

All of a sudden his heart just must have stopped. He gasped and rolled onto his back from his side. I ran for the nurse who got Dr. Frank King Jr. who was at the nurses desk. They gave him a shot into his heart, but Dad was gone!

I sat down on a hassock and put my head between my knees as I about fainted. Mom just kept rubbing his hands and saying, "Oh, Forrest!" Aunt Ruby hugged us both. Bless her.

The night that your grandfather passed away I was at a concert. Your grandfather requested that my Mom come to the hospital. Apparently he knew the end was near and felt your Mom and Grandmother needed someone be with them. [38 - Beverly Krause Jones]

Other notes about his death as told by Fern Brown Graber to her daughter. [3]

Forrest was very grouchy and harsh to his family when he was ill at last. It must have been the first day he was in the hospital (at the end of his life) that Fern went into the hallway and was crying about it. Forrest's doctor talked with Fern and then went in to talk to Forrest asking him if that was how he wanted them to remember him. Forrest was very nice to them after that. Also, Fern said that Lester finally realized his brother was going to die and went out in the hallway and cried.

Former Berrien Treasurer Dies [6] Forrest Brown, 55, Succombs At Mercy

Forrest Brown, 55, well known Benton Harbor business man and former Berrien County treasurer, died at 8:30 o'clock last night at Mercy hospital following a serious illness of six weeks. He had not been well for the past seven years.

Mr. Brown and his brother, Lester Brown, conducted the Ford agency in the twin cities, now operated by C. Creed, for six years, coming here from Baroda, where they had operated a similar business for about 10 years. Following the sale of the Ford business, the two brothers retained the building which also houses the Twin City Recreation Bowling alleys.

Mr. Brown was elected Berrien County treasurer in 1932 and 1934, resigning in 1934 [sic] to continue in the Ford business with his brother.

Mr. Brown was born Feb. 27, 1894 in Baroda, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Brown. On Feb. 11, 1925 he married Elsie Krause, who survives. He was a member of the Kiwanis club of St. Joseph, the Elks lodge of Benton Harbor, and a past treasurer of the Zion Evangelical church of St. Joseph of which he was a member.

The Brown family moved from Baroda to Benton Harbor in 1935, located at 2294 Colfax avenue, in Fair Plain, where they have since resided.

Surviving with his widow, and brother, Lester, is a daughter, Fern, who is a student at Michigan State college [sic], East Lansing[sic]. He also leaves a number of aunts, uncles, nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be held at 4 p.m. Monday at the Zion Evangelical church in St. Joseph with the Rev. E. A. Irion, pastor, officiating. Burial will be in Riverview cemetery.

The body will rest at the Kerlikowske funeral chapel, St. Joseph, until noon Monday when it will be taken to the church.

Many Attend Brown Funeral [6] Former Treasurer Is Laid To Rest

Funeral services were held at 4 p.m. Monday at St. Joseph's Zion Evangelical church for Forrest Brown well known Benton Harbor business man and former Berrien county treasurer, who died last Thursday night at Mercy hospital, following an illness of several weeks.

Rev. E. A. Irion pastor of the church, officiated and burial was in Riverview cemetery. There was a large floral tribute and services were largely attended.

The Kiwanis club of St. Joseph and the Elks lodge of Benton Harbor, of which Mr. Brown was a member were in attendance and the Elks performed their ritual at the graveside.

Mrs. Louise Kelly sang, "My God And I" and "The Lord's Prayer," accompanied by Mrs. Ben Riemersma.

Casket bearers were J. R. Byers, Robert Hickman, Robert Wieser, Vernon Deaner, Everett Howard and C. W. Beistle.

Forrest Brown Will Is Filed [39]

The will of the late Forrest Brown, Benton Harbor, and former Berrien county treasurer who died on May 19, was filed today in probate court.

The estate is valued at \$25,000 in real estate and \$1,500 in personal property.

Under the terms of the will the real estate will be held in trust by his widow, Elsie E. Brown, and his brother, Lester D. Brown, and the trustees are instructed to pay the widow three-fourths of the net proceeds from the trust and one-fourth to the daughter, Fern Brown, of Benton Harbor.

The will also stated that the trust shall terminate upon the death of Mrs. Brown, who also recieves the residue of the estate.

There was litigation of the probate in the 1960s and maybe into the 1970s. Elsie and Fern sued Lester. The problem seems to have been that Lester was undervaluing the rent that his business (the bowling alley) should be paying to the estate for use of the building. The only options Lester gave Elsie and Fern was to accept the rent he said was appropriate or sell the property to him at a price that Elsie and Fern found to be undervalued. Elsie and Fern were awarded judgment. Lester appealed to the Michigan Supreme Court, but they declined to hear the case. Once when I (Cindy) was doing probate research in the 1970s on relatives in the courthouse a man came up to the counter where I was waiting and asked to see the probate file for Forrest Brown. I was certainly surprised. I asked him why he was asking for that probate and he said he was a new lawyer and he was asked to study the case by his employer law firm. The clerk at the desk then commented that she believed the case file to be the largest one in the courthouse. [40]

Stanley played on baseball teams. He talked about the Upton team and House of David team. [16] Maybe he only played against the House of David team? [CAS]

Really one is foolish to clean all the time. I for one am turning over a new leaf... Even with this attack of flu my mind has been running like a 'gyrator'. I think of only the worst things - and Bill says I must get pleasure from those unhappy thoughts, otherwise, I'd think of only nice things. Guess he has something there. Poor Bill has been getting his own breakfasts for 5 weeks now. I told him I'd get in the swing tomorrow... Something facinating about working in the dirt though. I'll be glasd when I can start digging in the flower borders."

Martha always had a very clean house that I observed. Cindy Graber Schroeder [16]

Letter from Martha to her cousin Elsie Krause Brown, 17 SEP 1963 [3] ... "Always think of grape harvest on days like theses. - Actually it'd be nice to stroll around the farm for produce, but no part of actual labors do I want. Edna always enjoyed it more than I."

Martha did not have children, but was close to her step-son, Joe. [3] She was just crazy about babies, loved to change diapers!! And she and Bill grand-parented a couple of kids over the years. [14]

She and Bill had her niece, Thyra Krause, living with them in Norwich, NY, for several years. [3]

When Martha was having short-term memory problems she moved to Woodland Terrace. Physically she did well for quite a while and her far past long term memory was good. In 1999, she was playing a game in the activity center at Woodland Terrace when some friends stopped in to visit her. Each resident was telling that if they had a choice, what would they be doing. The friends said that Martha's answer was "I'd be going on a honeymoon." [9]

Martha and Bill purchased a blue Victorian loveseat while they lived in New York. It is lower in the middle of the back than on the ends of the

Ted Krause And Wife Are Victims [4] Deputy Sheriff's Car Hits Truck

A Berrien county deputy sheriff and his wife were killed Friday afternoon in a car-truck collision 21 miles north of Little Falls, Minn., on U. S. highway 10.

Dead are Alden F. (Ted) Krause, 52, and his wife, Mabel, 50, of 414 West Ferry street, Berrien Springs.

Krause, a turnkey at the Berrien county jail for the past 4 1/2 years, and his wife were on their way to Carmen, Manitoba, near Winnipeg to attend Mrs. Krause's brother's funeral. They left Berrien Springs for Canada late Thursday afternoon.

TELLS DETAILS

Sheriff Henry Griese, who talked directly to the Minnesota highway patrolman who policed the accident, gave this account:

The Krause car was in the process of passing three trucks when the accident happened shortly after 2 p.m. yesterday.

Krause had passed a pickup truck and started to pass a flat bed truck when the flat bed pulled out to pass a semi-trailer truck in front of it.

Krause sideswiped the flat bed, lost control of the car and crashed into the rear dual wheels of the semi-trailer. Both Krause and his wife were thrown from their car and died instantly.

Double funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. Tuesday in the First Methodist church, Berrien Springs, with the Rev. Theodore Bennink officiating. Friends may call Monday night at the McLauchlin funeral home. The bodies are being returned by McLauchlin ambulance.

The Krauses are survived by two daughters, Thyra, 19 and Kathryn, 16.

Deputy Krause was born May 3, 1910, in St. Joseph. He moved to Berrien Springs when he was seven years old with his parents, Theodore and Emma Krause. On Oct. 21, 1939, he married Mabel Bradshaw at his farm home on Long Lake road.

Survivors in addition to his mother, Mrs. Emma Krause of Long Lake road; two brothers, Charles M. of Long Lake road and Chester W., a Berrien Springs druggist; two sisters, Mrs. Edward F. Toney of Pittsburgh, Pa., and Mrs. William Rice of Norwich, N. Y. He was preceded in death by his father, a brother, and an infant son.

Mrs. Krause was born in Winnipeg, Ont., Can., May 3, 1912. She was a nurse for Clark Equipment company in Buchanan.

She is also survived by a sister, Mrs. Arthur Franklin of Winnipeg, Man.; two brothers, Arthur and Stewart of Canada.

It must be the cutie in a uniform I found in his box of military pictures. It was not my mother. They did not meet until later, when he had the store in Berrien. I had never heard of a fiancee, but from the picture I saw - I could tell he was fond of the petite, dark-haired gal. [12]

Comment about the look-alikes, Bud & Dad (Chet). Mom was a young schoolteacher in Berrien and borrowed a machine (adding machine, I think) from Bud in the store. She returned it the next day to Dad in the store, thinking it was the same guy ... and Dad said, how did you get our adding machine? That's how they met. He "wined & dined" her with ice cream at the store and the rest is history. [12]

Chet had the mumps just before he was married and Thelma had endometriosis (later having a hysterectomy). Thelma wanted to have a family. She told Chet that he was lucky - he could choose boy or girl. [12]

From 14 FEB 1972 letter from Edna Krause Toney to Fern Brown Graber [21] ... You know Chet and Thelma are down at Fort Meyers for a month. Just learned on Friday that their dear dog Bridget died -- they just took her everywhere with them -- she actually was almost human -- I'm not a real lover of dogs -- but Bridget was really something special to us all...

Veteran's Day is November 11 [18]

Krause, Shunkwiler will never forget this country's "fallen heroes"
Editor's Note: Each year in recognition of Veteran's Day, which is
Wednesday, Nov. 11, the Journal Era highlights one or two men or women
from our area who have served their country as members of the U.S. Armed
Services. This year we are featuring the stories of two veterans, Chester
Krause and Stanley J. Shunkwiler, who served during World War II (19391945) and are members of the Stover-Wagner Post 85, Berrien Springs
American Legion.

U.S. Air Force Medical Administrative Corps Capt. Chet Krause, 83, served his country during WWII by maintaining medical supplies for American troops on the front line and those in the hospitals. The young man from Berrien Springs would find himself working at the Pentagon in Washington, D. C., meeting Eleanor Roosevelt and many other significant political and military figures of that time. Krause observed the sacrifices made by many men and has "never forgotten all the fallen heroes."

Krause was born in Scottdale in a home on the corner of Hollywood and Marquette Woods roads. His parents, the late Theodore and Emma

Krause, moved to the Long Lake Road area when he was two-years-old. He went to Long Lake School (formerly located on the corner of Long Lake and Old U.S. 31 -- now a fruit stand is there) for eight years and had the same teacher, Ruth Dixon, the entire time.

"Before you could enter high school, you had to take a county examination to qualify for the ninth grade." Krause said. A lot of kids who took their schooling in the city couldn't pass it."

"There were 20-25 kids in the whole room at Long Lake School," he said. "There was a long bench in front of the room called the recitation bench. The teacher would say 'third grade front and center' and then if you were in the second grade you could hear what you would be getting the year ahead, and that would help."

Krause also recalled that there was a wood stove in the corner of the room and all the boys would take turns bringing in wood for it. The bathrooms were outside.

Krause passed his county examination and graduated from Berrien Springs High School in 1932. He went to Michigan State for one year, then transferred to the University of Pittsburgh Pharmacy School, graduating after four years in 1937. Right after graduation, he learned he had an interview with the Park Davis Cornpany in Detroit. He was hired to go to West Virginia to sell pharmaceuticals to physicians and hospitals.

Krause volunteered for the service at New Cumberland, Pennsylvania in March of 1942 at the age of 27. He received basic training at Drew Field in Tampa, Florida. He then applied for officer candidate school at Camp Barkley in Texas, and graduated from there in March of 1943. He was assigned as a medical supply officer at the Avon Park Bombing Range Hospital in Florida. He was later promoted to first lieutenant and ordered to report to headquarters at the Air Surgeon's Office at the Pentagon in Washington D.C. on Sept. 8, 1944.

Krause was surprised at his assignment to the Pentagon. His apartment, which took a while to find, was not too far from the White House.

"As a young kid from Berrien Springs, this was really outstanding, "he said.

His immediate boss was Colonel Gus Ledfors, a flight surgeon. Krause was promoted to captain and did a lot of traveling to make sure there were enough medical supplies. He went to several air corps hospitals and several air force headquarters.

 $\,$ lt was during his time at the Pentagon that he was able to see and meet Eleanor Roosevelt.

"I got to see her often, she was very active," Krause said. "I would see several big shots and the next day read about it in the papers. She was a nice person to talk to..."

Col. Ledfors told Krause he was considering going to the Philippines, and asked if would come if he sent to him after he got there. Krause responded that he would be "glad to come." Col. Ledfors was in the Philippines for six weeks when General Grant came to Krause's office, threw a request down on his desk and asked 'Did you and Gus have something cooked up before he left?' "No sir, general. I did not,' Krause responded. "I know how these things are," General Grant said. "If you want to stay, we would love to have you. If you want to go, go."

Krause said he left because he knew right where he was going -- to

the Headquarters of the Far East Air Service Command in Manila.

Krause did not have an easy time getting there. He went to Hawaii, Johnston Island (which was nothing but a choral reef), Kwajalein, and then he waited in Guam. He could not understand why they were unable to go to the Philippines right away. Krause later found out that that is when the U.S. dropped the atomic bomb on Hiroshima and the military "did not want anyone in the air."

Krause arrived in July of 1945 and served as medical supply officer at the Headquarters of the Far East Air Service Command. He surveyed the damage done by the Japanese and said "it was worse than it looked."

"I didn't know how it would ever get back to normal, the whole city of Manila was practically flattened," he said.

Krause took several photographs of the damaged buildings which went on for blocks in the business district.

Krause felt his luck with airplanes may be running out so when it came time to leave he returned on a ship called the General J.C. Breckinridge. He landed in San Francisco and left the service at Fort Sheridan in Illinois in March of 1946.

Krause decided to return to Berrien Springs and opened up Krause Pharmacy in Berrien Springs. His neighbors included an A&P store and Willson's Hardware. The bank building, where the Journal Era is now, had been empty for two years and Krause bought it for \$15,000. Krause, a longtime member and former president of the chamber of commerce and Rotary Club, was on the advisory board for First National Bank of Southwestern Michigan, headquartered in Niles.

"John Gillette was in charge of all bank real estate," Krause said. "I bought the building through him. The biggest job was taking the safe out of the first floor. I then installed a brand new soda fountain and called it Krause's Korner. We had booths, sold cards and gifts."

"The building next to it, a flower shop, then became available so I bought that building, put a hole through the wall, and moved my pharmacy there," [Krause] said. "I sold the other building across the street to Bill Willson and he enlarged his hardware store."

Krause was in business in downtown Berrien Springs for 25 years when two of his brothers died unexpectedly and he decided to sell his pharmacy/gift shop. He sold his businesses to Jerry Weiman.

"He paid me off in 10 years and never missed a payment." Krause said. "Eventually he liquidated it and sent all the files across the street to Schugs."

"I was only 55," he said. "I stayed home for a year doing nothing. My wife (Thelma Cameron Krause) said that is enough of this. There was an opening at Lee Memorial Hospital for a director of pharmacy and I took it. I worked at the hospital for eight years and really enjoyed it. I retired from there."

Dad decided he didn't want to continue the pressures of the store - i.e. people calling in the middle of the night for him to come in for prescriptions, handling the employment of the staff and not much chance for time off. I recall one middle of the night call for him to come in because they needed baby aspirin! And it was always a robbery risk. (He had two break-ins over the 25 years, pharmacies are real targets.) [12]

Remember it was a small town - and there were no late night stores available. And in the 60's there was increasing risk for drug robberies. And the store couldn't legally be open without a pharmacist on duty. Pretty tough in an Adventist town - 7 days to serve the customers. So lots of pressure, even staying late for cash-outs and scary night deposit trips (store closed at 9 pm). [12]

It took awhile to make the decision, arrange the sale, etc. So it was a process - not a knee-jerk reaction, explaining the years in-between Charlie's death and the sale of the store. [12]

He wanted to take some time off - as he had not had any for years. I think it was 1969, the year I graduated - not sure. Then he went to hospital pharmacies, with different pressures - but not as bad as running a retail business. [12]

Chet started needing someone to remind him of things. Peg found Laurie Bittner to fill this need. Laurie started spending part of each weekday with Chet -- they often would go out to lunch, she would mow, etc. Peg came each weekend. As Chet became more feeble in mind and body, Laurie started spending more time with him. When it came to the point that Chet was bedridden, Peg made arrangements with Laurie and her husband to purchase Chet's home and move in with him. They had been renting a home in Berrien Springs for years. Surprisingly, Laurie became pregnant and had her second child (boy named Luke) when she was 45 -- the birth being shortly after they moved into Chet's home. Her only other child - a daughter - was an adult already. About the last year of Chet's life he had a adorable baby boy living with him which I believe he enjoyed. [13]

Dad passed away quietly at home with us last evening the 19th. He had pneumonia, sepsis - likely from aspiration, and we opted for Hospice care. [12]

Chester 'Chet' Krause [14]

Chet was born March 9, 1915, in St. Joseph to Theodore and Emma (Schultz) Krause. He was a 1932 graduate of Berrien Springs High School and later attended Michigan State University. He graduated from the Pittsburgh School of Pharmacy in Pittsburgh, Pa., and served his country during World War II in the United States Army Air Corps. Chet earned the rank of captain in the Medical Admin-istration Supply Division, serving

for 4 1/2 years at the Pentagon and later in the Philippines.

On Aug. 24, 1947, he married Thelma Cameron Krause, who preceded him in death in 2000. The Krauses were the owners of Krause Pharmacy in Berrien Springs for 23 years. Chet will be remembered as a dedicated and caring pharmacist who always took the care of his community very seriously. Friends and family often remembered the many trips to the store after-hours to provide a needed prescription for someone in need. People in the community will always remember root beer floats and friendly conversation at Krause S. It's the little things in a little town that make life memorable for children, and Chet and Thelma had a big part in making life a joy for those who live here.

Following the sale of the store, Chet worked for an additional 10 years at Berrien General Hospital and at Lee Memorial Hospital before retiring in 1980. Following their retirement, Chet and Thelma continued to remain active members of the community and enjoyed visiting with all of their friends at local restaurants and shops. They also cherished the memories made with their friends at Cedar Lake.

Chet was member of Stover-Wagner American Legion, Post 85, and an active member of the Berrien Springs-Eau Claire Rotary. He enjoyed golfing in the Indian Lake Golf Course League and with dear friends at Cedar Lake.

Survivors include his daughter, Peg M. Krause of Holland, Mich.; nieces and nephews, Ted (Char) Krause of Berrien Springs, Marty Smith of Berrien Springs, Deb (Jamie) Chambers of Schoolcraft, Mich., Sally (Jay) Cohen of Laguna Beach, Calif.; most special friends and caregivers Laurie and Mike of Berrien Springs, and a number of extended family members and friends.

In addition to his parents and his wife, Thelma, Chet was preceded in death by three brothers, Arthur Krause, Alden Krause and Charles Krause; two sisters, Martha Rice and Edna Toney; and his sister-in-law, Clydene Kennedy.

The Triangle Texaco Station was built with an adjoining cafe, Wimpy's Triangle Cafe, run by Wilma. The cafe business took off from day one, and was in operation over 11 years. The ACRO Oil Company was closed two years after the Texaco station was built. The eldest son, Steven, drove the bulk truck for their oil business which held the first oil distributorship ever issued in

Minnesota.

After selling their business, Alwin and Wilma traveled extensively in all the states of the USA, Israel, Europe (1984) and the Ukraine (1998). Their priorities are God, family, and all things added to their life. Their marriage was blessed with five children: Steven (Ann), Arlen (Sharon), Elaine (Ralph) Miller, Wendy (Charles) Enter, and David (Cheryl); 18 grandchildren and 6 great grandchildren. Elaine and Ralph's daughter, Jennifer, married a Lutheran Missionary, Konstantin Mamberger, doing mission work in Kiev, Ukraine (his native land) during 1997-1998 and translating for the Lutheran Church, Missouri & Wisconsin Synods.

Harvey (and Della) and Alwin's wife, Wilma, are still residing in Jordan, MN. Wilma has a winter home in Florida. Harvey and Della's son, Marcus, lives in Jordan, MN, also, working at the Hubert Humphrey Metrodome in Minneapolis.
